Jazz Up Your Dance Floor Entice dancers at your reception with an inviting design.

While a power buffer and a splash of polish will brighten up a dull dance floor, why not inject some personal style to really make things sparkle?

All you need is a little inspiration to take your dance floor from ho-hum



- Avoid obstructing traffic or the view of the dance floor. "Whatever the decor, we always have to be mindful of blocking the guests' view of the action, which is usually taking place on the dance floor," says Linda Reeder, M.E.'s director of social sales.
- Any surface decorations must be thin and made virtually flush by taping the edges down.
- For obvious reasons, do not put anything slippery on the floor like rose petals or plastic streamers.



 Keep the tables at a good distance from the dance out of range of any overly enthusiastic dancers.

Themed decorations can be painted on the unfinished of inexpensive linoleum or vinyl flooring.
